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

- Smarthistory presents the basic cannon of Western art, and goes beyond it in some areas. It is group-written and began as a volunteer project. This may account for some inaccuracies. As the site has progressed, it has become more reliable. It has a simple interface for suggesting corrections, and in my experience, corrections are often made.

- Since the search includes all of the Khan Academy, it is sometimes hard to find an appropriate reference. Smarthistory has a table of contents with links to major sections, but as a student finishes a section there is no indication of how to get back to the table of contents or to go to the next section.
- The mix of videos and texts would serve various students, though it might be a challenge to find alternatives to each video in the texts.

- The videos are a little mixed in quality, but most make good use of labeling and panning to guide the student to the element being discussed and to clarify problematic vocabulary. Most videos are competently captioned. There are a few interactive features, such as linear perspective, which could explain a lot to a student motivated to interact with it. The texts are uneven in tone, some using "I" or "we" and others avoiding the first person.

Overall Comments

If you were to recommend this textbook to colleagues, what merits of the textbook would you highlight?

- There is a great deal of well-presented material in videos and in texts. Each piece has a unique URL, so directing your students to read what you've selected is simple. Links for further exploration accompany most sections.
- While using one of the surveys in print has the advantage of allowing students to annotate the text, for my students this is far outweighed by the price of art history textbooks.

What areas of this textbook require improvement in order for it to be used in your courses?

- I could use Smarthistory next time I teach a Renaissance to Contemporary survey. I do use it, along with other free materials from the web, in my caves through Medieval survey; it comprises about 25% of my course.
- Robust, password-protected question banks would be very helpful, if the questions were well-designed. The current quizzes are not.
